

Jose S. Pulido, M.D.

r. Jose S. Pulido is the newest member of the Vitreoretinal Service. He joined the full-time faculty as Assistant Professor of Ophthalmology on October 1. Dr. Pulido was born in Havana, Cuba, and moved with his family to the United States in 1961. He received a B.A. degree with honors after three years from the University of Chicago in 1976 and an M.S. in Chemistry from the same institution the following year. Dr. Pulido received his M.D. from Tulane University in 1981. After a year of internship in Internal Medicine at Tulane, he began his residency training in ophthalmology at The University of Illinois. NEW HOME ENVIRONMENT ROOM IN LOW VISION CLINIC

Under the direction of Dr. Thomas Farrell and Dr. Colleen Howe, a new "Home Environment Room" is being developed for the Low Vision Clinic. "room" will consist of several areas which resemble areas of the home such as the kitchen, living room, dining room, etc. Patients of all ages who are legally blind or visually impaired to a degree that they have difficulty with normal day-to-day functions, e.g. reading, performing tasks, or seeing distant signs and/or landmarks, will first have their vision assessed to see if they could benefit from certain low vision aids. They will then spend time working with Dr.

Howe in the "Home Environment Room" learning to use various techniques and aids to enable them to function safely and adequately in their day-to-day home environment. Such aids and techniques will include instruction in proper lighting and working distances and the use of magnifiers, special high-powered glasses, telescopes, and computers. Time will be spent determining which aids are most helpful in allowing the patient to complete specific tasks such as reading labels and signs, using the dials on the stove, or using utensils. Patients should then be able to transfer skills to their own home environment.

Fluorescein Angiographic Service for Outside Physicians

Patients scheduled mav now for Fundus Photography and Fluorescein Angiography on an outpatient basis without referring patient for other ophthalmic examination. Appointments may be made by contacting Ophthalmology Scheduling at 319/356-Twenty, thirty, and sixty degree cameras are available.

Specific instructions may be relayed directly to the photographers by calling 319/356-2339. A fluorescein angiographic interpretation may be requested and will be performed by one of the Retina Staff Physicians. Patients will be instructed to return to their local ophthalmologist for treatment and follow-up.

Research to Prevent Blindness Foreign Fellowship Award

Yasmyne Castillo-Ronquillo, M.D., an ophthalmologist from the University of the Philippines, has been awarded a \$15,000 Foreign Fellowship Award (\$1000 for research, \$14,000 for salary) from Research to Prevent Blindness, Inc. to study ophthalmic pathology with Dr. Robert Folberg. The Philippine Government is providing additional assistance in order for Dr. Castillo-Ronquillo to complete her training and serve as the ophthalmic trained pathologist in the Philippines.

Dr. Castillo-Ronquillo received her B.S. in Chemistry in 1973 and her M.D. in 1977 from the University of the Philippines. She has had postgraduate training at the University as a rotating intern, an ophthalmology resident, ophthalmology chief resident, research fellow in lens and vitreous research, and a consultant in ophthalmology. She is presently a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Ophthalmology at the University of the Philippines -Philippine General Hospital Medical Center in Manila. Dr. Castillo-Ronquillo has published in and is Associate Editor of the Philippine Journal of Ophthalmology.

Grants and Awards

Ronald V. Keech, M.D., Assistant Professor in Pediatric Ophthalmology and Adult Strabismus, recently received a \$5000 grant to study a practical means of developing an adjustable suturing technique for the superior oblique muscle. The grant was awarded by the College of Medicine Research Committee from funds provided by the Biomedical Research Support Grant from the NIH.

In October, the Department of Ophthalmology received a \$53,000 bequest from the estate of Esther Leffert of Centerville, lowa.

Drs. Robert Folberg and Thomas Farrell have each received an Educational Development Fund Grant "Interactive Video Disc Instruction" in ophthalmic pathology and basic ophthalmic examination from The University of Iowa College of Medicine.

The University is one of 10 medical schools belonging to a consortium sponsored by IBM to develop educational materials.

Dr. Garry Drummond received an \$18,000 fellowship grant from the R.S. McLaughlin Foundation in Canada.

The Department of Ophthalmology received \$35,000 in unrestricted funds from the Research to Prevent Blindness Program.



New Eye Bank Computer System

In the fall of 1987, a new computer system, developed by Mr. Paul Montague and Dr. Jay Krachmer, was installed and put into use at The University of Iowa Lions Eye Bank. This system replaces the original system at Emory University in Atlanta. Members of the Eve Bank Association of America can now access the new system via an 800 telephone number and list and locate available tissue. They can also shorten the search for needed tissue since the system allows storage of tissue data concerning age range, storage solution, cause of death and age of donor, cell count, time of death, and date and time of removal. Special messages can be sent between banks for research or surgical tissue.

New Editor



EX LIBRIS DESIGNED FOR C.S. O'BRIEN LIBRARY



NEW CHEMICAL HAZARD INFORMATION LIBRARY - CHIL

The University of Iowa Eye ■ Pathology Laboratory created an innovative "Chemical Hazard Information Library" with the acronym CHIL. CHIL is a computerized listing of all chemicals in the laboratory with 1) storage locations and availability requirements, 2) determination of "Known Chemical Hazard", 3) hazard ratings for health, flammability, and reactivity, and 4) personal protection recommendations. Computerization eases updating of information, aids in conducting physical inventory, and expands on requirements for Iowa's Chemical Hazard Right to Know Law by consolidating information.

The information in CHIL was compiled and ratings and recommendations determined by Paula Sufficool, research assistant and supervisor of the Eye Pathology Laboratory. The computer program was designed by Dr. Robert Folberg, Director of the Laboratory. By entering a chemical name, information on that particular chemical can be displayed and/or printed. A complete alphabetized listing or alphabetized listings by location can also be printed.

Copies and an explanation of methods to determine ratings were presented to the lowa Society of Histotechnology at their November 1987 meeting hosted by The University of Iowa Eye Pathology Laboratory in Iowa City. Interest has been expressed by other University of Iowa laboratories (research and clinical) in using the program to set up their own individualized chemical hazard information libraries.

DR. RUBIN ASSUMES PRESIDENCY



Dr. Melvin Rubin, who completed his residency in Ophthalmology at The University of Iowa in 1961, began his term as President of the American Academy of Ophthalmology in January 1988. Dr. Rubin will serve on the Academy's Board of Directors for 3 years following his year as President of the 14,000 member group. Internationally known as a clinician, author, lecturer, and teacher, Dr. Rubin has been chairman of the University of Florida's Department of Ophthalmology since 1978 and has been on the faculty for 24 years. He is particularly well-known for his research and treatment of eye diseases affect-

ing the retina and vitreous and his teaching in optics, visual refraction, and color vision abnormalities. He has authored 5 textbooks, one of which was chosen as "Best Medical Book of 1979" by the American Medical Writers Association. Rubin has also served as Chairman of the American Board of Ophthalmology and as President of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology.

1987 Statesmanship Award

In addition to the honor of being elected President of the leading organization in his profession, Dr. Rubin was recently awarded the 1987 Statesmanship Award from the Joint Commission on Allied Health Personnel in Ophthalmology. In making the award, Dr. Harold A. Stein, Commission President, stated "Throughout his professional career, Dr. Rubin has been a leader in the support, training and use of allied health personnel in ophthalmology. He has demonstrated dedication to the finest ethics and ideals of our profession." The Commission is the national organization that oversees training programs and gives accreditation examinations for ophthalmic medical assistants.
